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Tirohanga Whānui | Overview

We support the overarching whakaaro behind this amendment, but challenge its implementation. Digital harm and the exploitation of children in online spaces is a real issue, and we acknowledge the work of the member in bringing this very real issue forward.

Our main concerns are:

- 1. As written, section 126B of the amendment puts the onus on the victim to show that they have actually been harmed, or that an ordinary person would have been harmed.
- 2. The amendment lacks clarity as to the definition of 'harm' in this context.
- 3. The amendment lacks clarity as to what behaviours constitute offences under the amendments.
- 4. It is unclear the role of existing legislation in this space, e.g. the Harmful Digital Communications Act and how this amendment interacts / enhances what is already found in law.

Taunakitanga | Recommendations

Recommendation 1: Reframe the burden of proof so as not to cause revictimisation

Recommendation 2: Clearly define 'Harm' for this context.

Recommendation 3: Clarify as fully as possible the behaviours which constitute offences under the amendments

Recommendation 4: Clarify as fully as possible how this legislation interacts with existing legislation.
